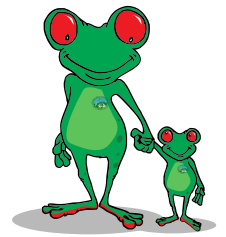

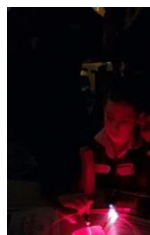

The teachers at Ironbark are always looking for new and exciting opportunities for our students. Over the past fortnight, we have attended a number of extracurricular activities which could not take place without parental support. A VERY BIG THANK YOU to our wonderful parents, who have transported children, helped with equipment and supported our students. Last week students in Stage 2 and 3 had the opportunity to attend a dynamic STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics) workshop at Wahroonga Public School. Our Stage 2 students conducted HEAT experiments and learned how to design a thermally-efficient home. Stage 3 students conducted LIGHT experiments to solve a fun, problem-based challenge using light. Housekeeping items



Can you believe it is time to begin our local Kindergarten enrolments for 2017? If you have a little person who is planning to come to our dynamic school next year, please go online or pop along and get an enrolment form from the office. Our friendly staff will be happy to answer any questions and help you to secure that highly sought after Kindergarten position.

Parents you may be aware that absentee notes have been requested quite quickly during this term. As a school, we need to follow the Department of Education's policy and procedures. We wish to remind you that when your child is absent from school it is a requirement that the absence be covered with a full explanation. The explanation must have a reason for their absence. If a child is late to school, it is a requirement that the parent sign the child in at the office. Reasons such as being late due to traffic or slept in will be recorded unjustified. Your child will be handed a late slip to give to their teacher. This indicates the child has been signed in. It is the same procedure if a parent wishes to take their child early from the school. The school each fortnight will send home a request for absences not covered with a parental explanation. Please complete these in full and return to the school. Individual attendance rates are reviewed by Home School Liaison Officers, including lateness to school. It is very important that we meet the Departments recording requirements. Thank you to all of those parents who promptly supply absence notes on their child's return to school.

Internet Safety



Don't forget that on Tuesday 14th June, Senior Constable Rob Paterson will conduct a parent/carer presentation titled 'Protecting Kids Online'. This covers privacy and reputation management. Cybersafety/ bullying is the number one non-academic problem that schools and young people experience today. Online behaviour often affects students' self-esteem, learning and relationships. Children are now exposed to images, words and behaviour that is most inappropriate for their age and this can be accessed through the internet, social networking and online gaming. Parents must know how to use technology and should know what to avoid, where to seek help and what their children are doing online. Parents and carers must have at least a basic understanding of social media in order to keep their children safe.

The Premier's Reading Challenge began on the 7th March and is an annual event which is run across the whole of NSW to encourage students to read a range of texts and develop a love of reading. Kindergarten students are challenged to read 30 books during the challenge period, which ends on the 19th August. Kindergarten students at Ironbark Ridge complete this during their library time each week, and the results are entered at school by the library teacher. All students are well on their way to achieving the goal!

Each Stage 1 class has their own buddy class in Stage 3 that they meet up with twice a week to work on specific reading activities set by the teacher. The younger students read aloud to the older students, often take mini whiteboards to practise their sight words on or work on their 'Words Their Way' sounds.

The older children are wonderful listeners and discuss the story with the younger children, asking questions to help them with comprehending the text. It is not unusual to see them assisting the students with everything from sounding out words to correctly forming letters on their mini boards.

The students have all enjoyed getting to know students from other grades and it is wonderful to see them greeting each other not only at buddy reading time but also at other times throughout the school day.

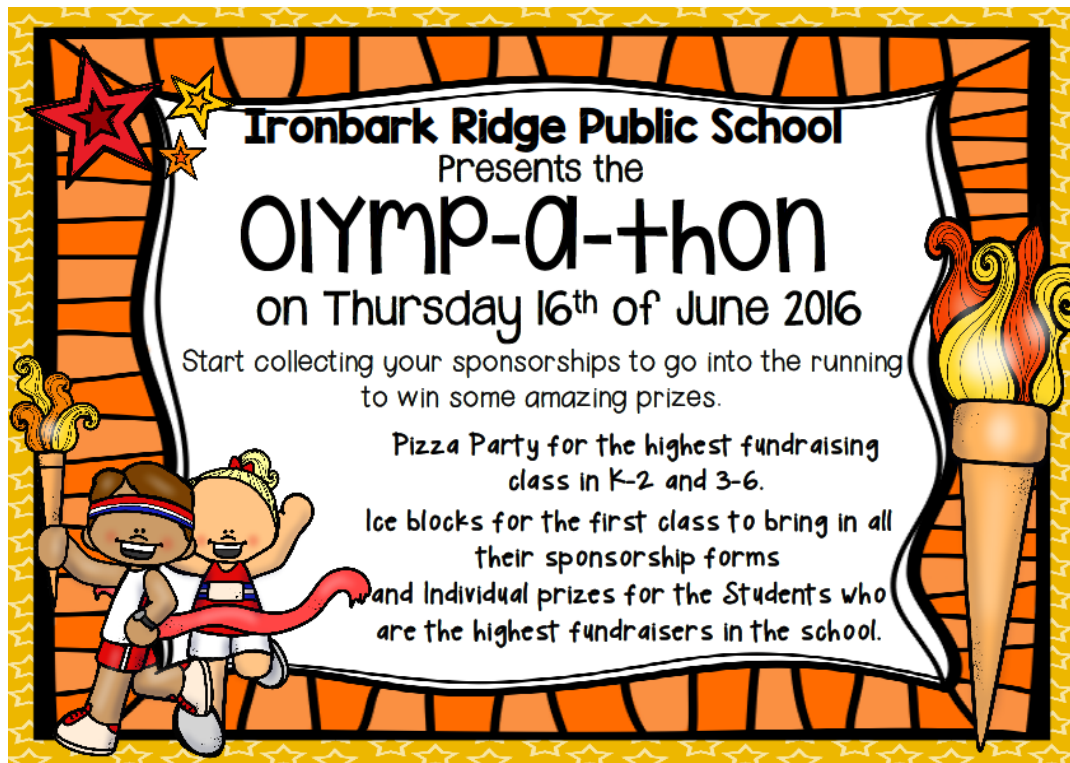

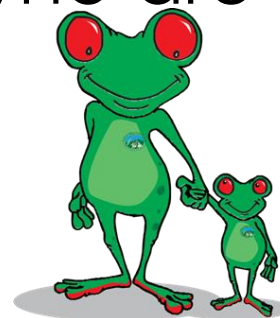

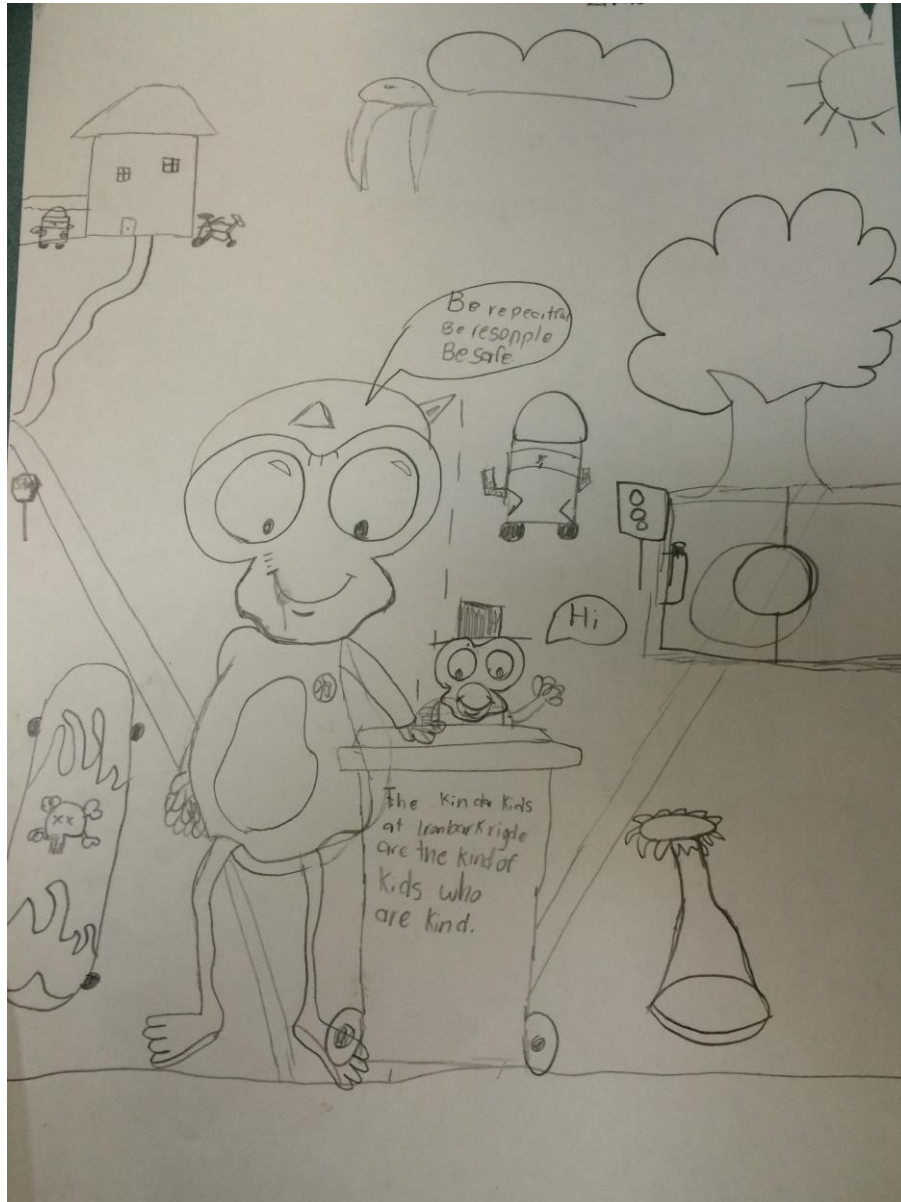

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Camellias

Camellias are an evergreen ornamental shrub, ever popular for their prolific flowering in autumn and winter, when everything else has finished flowering or gone into dormancy. A great screening option, and can be planted along fence lines and shaded areas.

There are two main types of Camellias: **sasanqua** and **japonica**.

What's the difference between C. japonica and C. sasanqua?

Sasanquas have an open spreading habit. They also have a better tolerance of sun and tend to have single flowers that are usually white or pink. Blooms start to appear in autumn. Leaves are a shiny dark green, and they are not as tolerant to cold temperatures as japonicas.

Japonicas have a bushier, denser habit and are generally taller. They flower a little later than sasanquas and have a broader leathery leaf. Flowers are also larger and have much more variation in colour and form. Blooms are more fragrant than sasanquas too.

How to make Camellias thrive?

Organic Soil > Provide quality organic soil that is slightly acidic. Use cow manure or compost.

Mulch > Camellias are very shallow rooted and benefit from mulch and regular watering.

Semi Shade > Japonicas are susceptible to leaf burn. Sasanquas are OK in sun, but prefer semi shaded position. If in sun, they will need more water.

What to plant with Camellias?

Camellias work in well with Helleborus, Buxus, Liriodendron and Azaleas. Camellias are shallow rooted, therefore avoid planting directly under them.

Which Camellias are popular?

These are just a few of the Camellias we have at Plantmark, come down and check out our great range today.

Winter marks the start of bareroot season! Now is the time to start planting bare root stock so roots can establish before spring arrives. Our range includes fruit trees and ornamentals such as roses, flowering cherries (both weeping and tree form), claret ash, ornamental pears, and buxus.



To best establish your bareroot stock will also need:

- > Seamungus is great for establishing bareroot roses
- > Liquid fertiliser such as Charlie Carp or Seasol
- > Organic Cow Manure
- > Mulch

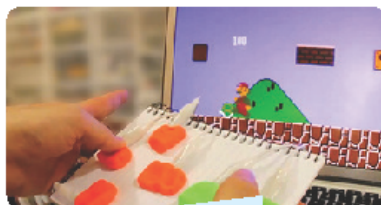
