PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Book Characters

Being joined by so many grandparents and friends last week for our celebration of Reading showed what a supportive, cohesive community Ironbark Ridge is. The atmosphere during our Book Character Parade was fun and friendly, with every student receiving recognition for their costumes... even the few 'Captain Ironbark' uniforms ©. Some of our community are definitely from the 'book' camp, and appreciate the finer literary book character references; shout out to Alice (aka Brooke KD) and of course "the caravan" from the "Sydney Caravan and Camping Show Guide 2019"). Other students simply enjoy a chance to dress up, and the Marvel/DC and Disney franchises get a good workout. Either way, we are Ironbarkers, and together we make this amazing, welcoming school the wonderful place to learn and grow that it is.



The Ironbark Way...

Ridgy the Frog, in the guise of learning 'hero' walks ahead and shows us the way to be response-able at school, the way to be responsible learners. When faced with challenges and when a mistake is made, Ridgy responds with a positive mindset, pleased with the chance to adjust and improve... to grow. Young people, in

search of guidance along the way to growth, find role models to emulate. With the infestation of online fiends to follow it's our role as parents and teachers to guide our children's choice of 'heroes'. This needs to be sensitively done, and is more successful at a younger age. For this reason, we are fashioning Ridgy as a many-faceted 'hero' for our Ironbarker students. Ridgy sets off into the difficult jungle and swamp of learning, where a backpack of tools are required to stay safe, to be successful, to keep growing. Although our current focus is on Learner Habits (see below), we have already established a clear set of social expectations about being Safe. Respectful and Responsible... ideals that can be incorporated into your home discussions about being a good person.

After all, our learners, these young citizens, need a role model to show how to walk... The Ironbark Way.

Review - Chinese

After much deliberation, debate and examination of research evidence relating to the learning of additional languages, we have decided to suspend the classroom teaching of Chinese-Mandarin at the end of 2019. Our learning programs in mandatory curriculum areas such as Science, History and Music (amongst many) would benefit from increased time allocation each week, allowing more *inspiration* through integrated approaches such as STEM learning. With Chinese being an extra Learning Area, and evidence of positive impact on thought patterns and learning relying on a far more intensive exposure to second-language learning, this has been a difficult but clear decision. We are mindful of and apologise for the disappointment this may cause in some of our Ironbarker families. We are hopeful that additional after-school Chinese language lessons can be offered by the Peiji Chinese school for our non-Chinese students if families choose to pursue continue to grow and learn in this area. Peiji Chinese School already operates lessons on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons. Chinese language learning is offered at Rouse Hill High School and we encourage our students to take this up when they reach high school.

Feedback (a Successful Learner Habit)

Staff were amused at last Thursday morning's meeting when we tested our throwing skills on the basketball court, trying to throw over our shoulder, unseen, to a partner. At first, our team could only call out encouragement and praise, with cries of "Well done!", "Good try!" and "Great Effort!" ringing out. This form of feedback is actually not very helpful, however it's often all we offer. At times it can be received in a negative, condescending way that discourages the attempts of a learner.

At second attempt to throw to our partner we could be given instructive feedback from our team. Specific directions such as "Another three metres to your right." and "Higher and

twice as far!" proved very effective in assisting our thrower in hitting the target.

Feedback is crucial when we are navigating unchartered territory in our learning. A good learning guide will know where the learner is currently performing, and will provide specific directions about ways to improve and grow towards mastery of the task. Successful Learners get into the Habit of asking for corrective feedback from others around them, and try to match their own products against examples of success. We might call this feed-forward as well...

Uniform

As we prepare to introduce a new girls' uniform additional item to you all I'm wondering what your opinion is on this question...

Play Space ideas

As we are planning to design a new play space we'd like to get your ideas. We're thinking less about colourful monkey-bars, swings and slides, and more along the lines of natural materials, imaginative and sensory places to hide and hang out. For example, a dry creek bed with stepping stones, a bridge for a troll to hide under and three goats to 'trip-trap' over, a mysterious old tree to climb and get a good view from, balance beams, hidey-holes in the wall to climb into and share a giggle with a friend, etc. Have a look for good ideas and send them in with your children to their class SRC member. Our SRC will be collecting the ideas of all of our students so we are ready for design workshops in the first week of Term 4. Our students never stop to amaze us with their skills and creativity. Year 5 have been writing some fantastic poems.



ADMINISTRATION

STUDENT ABSENCE NOTIFICATION

Up until recently, the best way to notify the school of the reason for your child's absence was through the Ironbark Ridge Public School app. When you advise us of an absence through this app, it comes to us in the form of an email. We print out this email and pass it on to the teacher to record on the Sentral system. Consequently, this process can take a little while for the records to be updated.

In the meantime, each morning, we send an email to <u>every</u> family where a child has been marked absent. Our email to you is just a reminder for you to let us know why your child is absent <u>if you haven't already done so</u>. The email states that if you have already advised us of the reason for the absence to disregard this email. So please just ignore this reminder email if you have already advised us via the app, email, phone call or through the Sentral parent portal.

Sentral Parent Portal

We recently gave parents access to the parent portal on the Sentral system. Using this system, you can notify us of the reason for your child's absence. This is much quicker for us to update our records as the information can be transferred directly across to the Sentral system - it doesn't need to be printed or given to the teacher to record. It's just the click of a button - so you will be less likely to receive one of our reminder emails if you notify us in this way. We are currently still receiving notifications through the Ironbark Ridge Public School app, but the Sentral portal is the best way to notify us going forward.

Using the Sentral parent portal, you can also view your child's past absences and check that the reason for the absence has been recorded.

Please note that parents must provide an explanation for absences within 7 days from the first day of any period of absence. Where an explanation has not been received within 7 days, the reason for the absence will be recorded but will be marked as "unjustified" on the student's record regardless of the validity of the reason.

In English this term, students have enjoyed reading a variety of persuasive picture books and using reasons to support their opinions when writing persuasive texts. Students enjoyed the interactive nature of the planning, drafting, publishing and sharing of their texts. Students have enjoyed offering constructive feedback to their peers to help them improve, and have been learning to apply feedback given to them.

Helping kids tolerate discomfort

Few right-minded people want children or young people to experience hardships or difficulty. However growing up generally means that kids will experience their fair share of hardships, frustrations and challenges which lead to uncomfortable feelings.

Exercising their discomfort muscles

Tolerating discomfort is an important resilience skill. It refers to an ability to sit with an uncomfortable or emotionally painful feeling such as disappointment, apprehension, nervousness or fear. These emotions can be brought about as a result of not being picked for a team; getting lower than expected marks for an assignment; or going into new, unfamiliar situation such as school camp. These are the sorts of every day situations that can make some kids feel uncomfortable. It's helpful to think of discomfort as a 'muscle' that gets stronger with training. Each time a child or teen successfully tolerates discomfort they're reinforcing their ability to do so and cementing the knowledge that they can overcome emotional challenges.

Opportunities to practise tolerating discomfort

Opportunities for practice are plentiful and are found in common situations such as when a child or teen is: feeling hungry; wanting something they can't have; having to end screen time; contributing to household chores when they don't feel like it; missing out on a job interview; asking someone on a date or not receiving a party invitation.

It's not toughing it out

Tolerating discomfort doesn't mean toughing out an unbearable situation. It's teaching your anxious child to notice how they're feeling, naming their emotions, and practising acceptance of difficult feelings as they occur. This is done in the knowledge that what they're experiencing is temporary and that they're lovingly supported by a warm and comforting adult. Couple tolerating discomfort with social rewards (such as words of praise or shared fun activity) for coping behaviours and you're helping to build their personal resilience.


