This year has developed new levels of resilience in all of us, no doubt... however we all still benefit greatly from occasions when we hear how thankful others are for the hard work we do for our students.


What Works Best... Wellbeing!

Wellbeing is a broad term that encompasses many dimensions, including cognitive, social, physical and emotional health. For students, evidence shows that higher levels of wellbeing are linked to higher academic achievement, school attendance, better overall mental health and a more pro-social and responsible lifestyle. Supporting student wellbeing in a school is the responsibility of us all – it relies on a collaborative partnership between families and the school. At Ironbark Ridge we use a wide and varied range of practices and initiatives to support student wellbeing. These are most effective when they integrate to promote a supportive environment across the whole school. As part of our current school review and 'Situational Analysis' we are collecting evidence for the effect of each

separate initiative and weighing this up with the investment of time and energy to plan improvements, additions and even which programs to *decommission* as we move into the 2021 year.

Successful Learner Habit: Self-Reliance

(We are all Ironbarkers... We are all Learners.) This fortnight our students are concentrating on being more self-reliant, and also on the skills of collaboration. Students who are practising self-reliance independently read, interpret, listen to, predict, analyse and are able to carry out (age-appropriate) sets of instructions from a variety of sources. They are able to use routines and prior experience to assist others and be independently organised without any prompts. A self-reliant learner tries at least three different approaches before seeking assistance from their teacher/leader/parent (these can include watching others for modelling and asking a peer for guidance or advice).



Smart

A quote from the book I'm currently reading:

"What matters is not how smart you are... but how you are smart!"

It's so important we remind our children that there are <u>many different ways of being intelligent</u>, of being a 'genius'; different ways of finding success and growth. Physical, creative, artistic, interpersonal, verbal, organisational and musical brilliance should be valued equally with academic and analytical prowess. Howard Gardiner's theoretical work on *Multiple Intelligences* prompts good discussion and healthy balance. We want all of our Ironbarkers to find and pursue their own challenges and success in life.

Planning update

Teachers are continuing their process of measuring and collecting evidence of student growth across 2020 so they can write student progress reports, and in parallel we are continuing the task of collecting evidence of the impact of our school-wide learning programs. At next Wednesday night's P&C meeting we will present further information to you all of the indicators that data analysis is providing us with so far. In the true spirit of evaluative thinking we are with-holding our judgement and attempting to avoid confirmation bias – hence strategic planning is only in formative stages until later in the year. However we will enjoy giving you some insight into our current findings. Thank you so much to the almost 100 of you who took the time to complete our *Tell Them From Me* survey as it has given us excellent information about your opinions for us to now tussle with. All of our Year 4-6 students completed a similar survey last term and their opinions are obviously of vital importance to us as we collectively draft the future of Ironbark Ridge. We will publish a presentation for you to view at your leisure if you are not able to join us next Wednesday night via Zoom for the 7pm P&C meeting.

Sports Fun Day – Canteen

With our upcoming Sports Fun Day for Year 3-6 students almost upon us (Monday 9th November), a quick message that only special Canteen lunches will be available through FlexiSchools on that day. Please note that for simplicity, the whole menu will change for the day and K-2 students will need to order from the lunch-pack selection as well. Please check the online menu for more details.

Kindy visitors

Due to changes in school guidelines, next week will be the first visit for our 2021 Kindy students, and unfortunately our usual live information sessions are now all in online presentation format. Parents will also be required to wait outside the school grounds, ensuring we can maintain our *School* = *Safe Zone* practices. We are really looking forward to meeting all of our new young visitors, and know they will benefit immensely from this opportunity to get a feeling for what 'big school' will be like next year. Sorry Zoom, but there are some things that you can never replace, and being in a real classroom is one of them!!

Diwali

On Thursday 12th November we will celebrate Diwali, the festival of lights, at Ironbark Ridge with some fun and creative activities organised and run by our Student Leadership Team. All of our students will have the opportunity to participate during their lunchtime. Collectively we will create a patchwork design... and our annual time-lapse video will keep track of the progress – look out on our YouTube channel for the results of this celebration.

School start date change for 2021 (and finish dates, too)

The NSW Department of Education has made a change to the School Development Days (SDD) for next year, 2021. Teachers will now *begin* the year with <u>two</u> days of professional learning, team planning and classroom learning preparation; on Wednesday 27th and Thursday 28th January. This of course means that the first day of school for students in Years 1 to 6 will now be Friday 29th January. New Kindy students will have their Best Start interview assessments and will not start in classes until Thursday 4th February to ensure a smooth transition to 'big school'.

At the **end** of 2021 there will <u>only be one SDD</u>, on Friday 17th December, with the last day of school for students now being on Thursday 16th December, 2021.

Parenting is a demanding and inexact science, however there is plenty we can glean from the experiences, successes and failures of others. Why make the same mistakes as those who went before us when we can learn from them and avoid these pitfalls? Our children rely on us to constantly be achieving growth in our job (parenting), just as we expect them to make growth every year. Take the time to sharpen your parenting saw and read a book or watch a webinar!

As usual, I've included an article by Michael Grose, parenting expert from <u>www.parentingideas.com.au</u> a bit later in the newsletter. This week it has further instructions about how to piggy-back off our school membership to register **for free** for an online learning session about parenting styles. Be a learner just like Ridgy the Frog!

Childhood Anxiety Treatment - study

Anxiety is defined as feelings of nervousness, worry and fear that is usually brought on by seeing or experiencing certain triggers or events, and/or by the expectation that something is too frightening or difficult to cope with. Anxiety can be helpful when dealing with new challenges and novel situations. However, if it occurs too often or too strongly, it can lead to children not coping in many situations. For many children and their parents, anxiety can be highly disruptive and prevent children from doing things that other children their age can do. Volunteers are being recruited for a university-led study/project that will examine two treatment conditions and determine if they are as effective as each other in alleviating children's anxiety disorders. Collecting evidence to support interventions and support programs such as these is an important part of evaluation and medical application... in much the same way as we evaluate our learning programs here at Ironbark Ridge. I encourage families from the Ironbark Ridge learning community who consider this of interest to their children's healthy development to read the brochure later in the newsletter and to use the handy links to contact the study's authors.

Reports

Teachers are engaged in ongoing assessment of progress towards outcomes for all of the students in our school. Parents/carers of all students are to be provided with a formal report on their child's learning twice a year. In Semester 1, 2020 interim modifications were made to the requirements due to COVID-19. In Semester 2, 2020 the interim modifications will no longer apply and you will receive a full report in December. Reporting to parents/carers will continue to focus on the learning that has taken place with guidance to move learning forward.

Celebration Day Changes

This year Celebration day will be held on Tuesday 8th December at Rouse Hill High School. There will be some changes to our usual way of operating that are in line with Department of Education guidelines and working to keep our children and community safe. Although parents will be unable to attend, we will still formally acknowledge many students for their outstanding work and effort this year. The final details will be provided closer to the date. The Year 6 farewell committee is also deep in planning to ensure that we farewell our wonderful Year 6 students in the best way possible under the current guidelines. Online Enrolments

We're very excited to announce that online enrolments are now available at Ironbark Ridge Public School. The online enrolment system digitizes and streamlines enrolment processes for both parents and for schools.

The system is being developed in stages and currently only accommodates applications for local students into their local school.

KINDY CAPERS

Term 4 is now well under way and Kindergarten students are enjoying participating in the various learning activities planned by their teachers.

Remember that each week students have an opportunity to develop their talking and listening skills by sharing news with their classmates. You will have received a note/email advising you of your child's news day and the topics set for each week. Please support your child by discussing the topic and their ideas before their news day. Such conversations are valuable as they help students gain confidence and feel comfortable and prepared before speaking to their peers.

Our much-anticipated excursion to Calmsley Hill Farm is booked for Monday 23rd November. Most students have already paid however due to the revised date we require parents to sign and return a new permission form. The new note was emailed to all families from the school office.

We have had a productive and enjoyable last three weeks. We cannot believe we are already heading into week 4!

Term 4 Stage 2 Curriculum Outline:

English: In writing we are focusing on hybrid texts and the skill of crafting a cohesive paragraph. In reading groups, students are focusing on practicing and furthering skills at student's individual levels through small group instruction and reciprocal reading. For spelling, students are participating in the 'Words Their Way' where students are working at differentiated levels.

Mathematics: Continuing skills and knowledge in the areas of number and algebra, measurement and geometry, and statistics and probability.

PDHPE: Focusing on developing our social and emotional development to build resilience when faced with challenge.

Science: Students are exploring scientific concepts including changing states of matter through a unit called 'A material World'.

Sport: Students are focusing on developing skills through a range of sporting games and furthering their fitness through fitness rotations.

Geography: We are continuing our investigating in the unit 'Places Similar and Different'.

2020 Sports Fun Day!

In lieu of an athletics carnival all students in Years 3-6 will be participating in the school Sports Fun Day at Hills Centenary Oval Rouse Hill on **Monday 9th November 2020.** Students are to arrive at school no later than 9:00am and will walk to and from the oval accompanied by teachers. Students should wear their sport uniform or a shirt in their house colour. They will need to bring a hat, sunscreen, recess, lunch and plenty of water. Students also need to carry their own Ventolin puffer if required. There will be NO canteen at Hills Centenary Park and lunch orders will be available with a modified menu. There is no cost for the carnival. No parents will be allowed to attend the carnival due to COVID restrictions. Students will return to school by 1:30pm where they will deoart school as usual at 3pm. parenting *****ideas

A flexible approach to raising kids



This year's unique challenges have brought a sharper focus on child-rearing styles. Parents who rely one style have often struggled to meet the emotional needs of their children.

Kids who are worried, fearful or fretting about the future initially benefit from a nurturant, empathetic approach. "I get it" is what they want to hear so they feel safe and secure. They also benefit from a firmer approach where an adult communicates "You can cope with this" is something kids need to hear when they experience change, difficulty and disappointment.

This combination of nurturance and firmness is known as an authoritative approach according to Diane Baumrind, a leading researcher on parenting styles. A purely nurturant style is known as a permissive style, while a singularly firm style is known as a uthoritarian.

Warm cat, firm dog

It's helpful to use a cat and dog metaphor when discussing the authoritative approach. As dog-owners know these pets are highly relational and respond favorably to attention. The dog style of parenting is empathetic and has an encouraging, relationshipbuilding focus. Cats, on the other hand, are usually self-sufficient and can live happily without you. Continuing the metaphor, the cat style of parenting is more likely to challenge kids, better able to manage poor behaviour and provide solid family leadership.

Body language counts

The dog-cat styles are expressed through our non-verbal language – our tone of voice, posture and heads. A cat speaks in a flat, clipped voice using a minimum of words. Their head is still, its body upright and confident. A cat is calm, quiet and in control. A dog, on the other hand, speaks with lots of inflection in their voice. They'll smile a great deal and lean in when they speak. It's a warmer more approachable style suited to conversations and building relationships.

Which style do you identify with?

Most people naturally have a preference for one style over the other. If you defer to one then you may have to work a little harder or more consciously to bring the other side to the fore. Many parents working in partnership with each other will share the dogcat loads. One parent is firm in approach, while the other uses a warmer, more personal approach. Sometimes parents switch styles according to the gender or personality of their children. This is quite common as boys have a tendency to bring out the firm cat in their fathers and the warmer, protective dog-side in their mothers.

Conversely, fathers often respond to their daughters in dog-like ways and anecdotally, it seems, many mothers are more naturally cat-like with their daughters. Single parents without the luxury of sharing the parenting will generally need to be flexible and move between the two styles.

parenting *****ideas

Avoid mixed messages

Get your cat and dog wrong and you risk being ineffective and failing to meet either a child's needs or the needs of a particular situation. If your first response to a child's difficulty is to be distant and unapproachable, then you are probably not meeting their immediate emotional needs. Your child or young person needs you to be approachable or dog-like when they come to you with genuine concerns. Conversely, approach a child or teen whose behaviour isn't up to standard with a dog-like approach and you'll be ignored or not taken seriously, leaving you either angry or deflated.

Flexibility is the key

It's my experience that it's possible to move seamlessly between the two modes but it takes awareness and practice. If you naturally default to cat mode, then you may have to put some conscious effort into responding with empathy and nurturance when your child or young person struggles. Alternatively, you may practise dog-like behaviours easily but have to work on your cat side to promote independence and manage your child's behaviour. In time these switches become automatic as your awareness grows enabling you to adopt new ways of parenting. Your effectiveness and satisfaction levels will increase as you move seamlessly between the cat and dog parenting styles.

- One treatment helps children learn to control the focus of their attention on helpful things around them.
- The other treatment helps children learn to think differently and approach things they fear.


Each treatment includes information, telephone or email support for parents in assisting their child to better manage anxiety.

School Travel for 2021



2021 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12 October 2020.

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass for 2021 can now <u>apply</u> online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a school travel pass for the first time or requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>re-apply or update their details</u>.

*Applications must be completed by the student's parent or legal guardian if the student is aged under 16 years. Students 16 years and over must complete the application form themselves.

Where there is a change of distance eligibility based on a student's grade, the system will automatically update a student's entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new <u>eligibility criteria</u>, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

If a student needs to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to <u>https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails</u>

Applications need to be submitted before **31 December 2020** to ensure that current student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card remains valid. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2020, the system will automatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued.

Students in the Opal network applying for a SSTS or Term Bus Pass entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2021.

Students residing in Rural and Regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the commencement of the new school year from their nominated operator, this may be distributed via the school or sent direct to their address. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/Parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

New Concession Entitlement Cards

Transport for NSW will be replacing the below cards with Transport Concession Entitlement Cards (TCEC) from October 2020:

- Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) also used by Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students
- Proof of Age card (when a student under 16 years of age looks older)
- Boarder Rail Pass.

All previous cards will be valid until they expire. Students who require a Transport Concession Entitlement Card should speak with their school administration staff.
